This confusion could easily be avoided by making the cafeteria focus clear from the outset by revising the title of the video and reworking the intro. Second, the explanation by the teacher is good, but the lack of b-roll during his clip makes it a 70-second talking head segment, which is way too much. Third, the audio volume is inconsistent. The off-camera narration volume is good, but the on-camera audio volume is too low. Fourth, the real news — about the actual lunch price increase — is left for the end. That should have been part of the intro. Lots of potential here, though!
